Section 2: Our Programmes

Over the years SES has been focusing on working with children, youth, women and elderly from the vulnerable and neglected communities on Health care, Education, Women Empowerment, Emergency & Crisis Response, Housing & Environmental Sustainability and Awareness creation on various issues.

Health care

- 1. **Substance Abuse:** SES has established Community based Peer Led Interventions (CPLI) in collaboration with the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment in East Delhi to help children in the age group of 10-18 years who are either addicted to substance use or prone to exposure. We build awareness through individual and group counselling, gamified activities and engaging them in multitude of activities to boost their motivation and morale. We also help addicted children access timely support for dead diction.
- 2. Cancer Care: SES, in its mission to enhance cancer care, has conducted five impactful health camps in Uttar Pradesh. Through these camps, SES has successfully screened over 150 individuals for cancer. Beyond screening, SES has established a robust network of linkages, ensuring that diagnosed individuals receive timely referrals and access to specialized treatment and support services. The health camps also serve as vital platforms for disseminating crucial information about cancer prevention, early detection, and available treatment options. The focus on screening is a proactive measure to identify potential cases in their nascent stages, facilitating timely intervention and improving treatment outcomes.
- **3. Health Awareness Camps:** SES organizes health camps in the slums and resettlement colonies of East Delhi to build awareness on various issues like importance of general health check-up, exhibition of different IEC materials along with group discussions and one to one interaction.

Further as part of its Targeted Initiatives SES work with specific communities who face stigma and discrimination due to their sexual orientation or health conditions. This project is being supported by Delhi State AIDS Control Society. Targeted interventions are a resource-effective way to prevent HIV and run care programs in settings with low-level and concentrated HIV epidemics. They are also a cost-effective method of reaching people who are most at risk in more generalized epidemics.

- 4. **Men Having Sex with Men (MSM):** SES works towards sensitization and awareness building with MSMs in East Delhi to ensure they are free from disease-risk and do not face discrimination due to identity-based on their sexual orientation. We offer prevention and care services to high-risk population MSMs within the communities. We are building awareness, means and skills they need to minimize HIV transmission but also enhancing their access to care, support and treatment services.
- 5. **HIV/AIDS** infected and affected children and families: SES has been supporting 2000 families who are affected (and in some cases infected family members) across East Delhi and Northwest Delhi. SES provides them with essential counselling, nutritional food, and supplements along with healthcare support.

Education:

- 1. **Remedial and Non-Formal Education**: SES is running a education centre to provide bridge course for children from the weaker section of the community. The programme targets children in the age group of 6 to 14 years, who either have not had the opportunity to go to any formal school or have dropped out. Nearly 65 students are getting benefited through this programme
- 2. **Teach India: SES in collaboration with xxx has been providing** English speaking for children who face a setback due to lack of English speaking skills. This programme helps them overcome their setback and increases their opportunities for employment.

Women Health & Empowerment:

- 1. **MenstrualHealthandHygiene(MHH)** focusses on the well-beingandempowerment of women and adolescent girls as menstrual health continues to constraint due to culturaltaboosanddiscriminatorysocialnorms.
- 2. Mahila Panchayat: SES has empowered groups of women in Lakshmi Nagar and Jagatpuri East Delhi to collaborate and empower womenin legal issues so that they are able to handlevarious issues like domestic violence and other social issues faced by women and distress redressal at the community level. Groups of community women, identified by SES, form a panchayatand take up local disputes, counsel the two parties and assist them in reducing violence and disputes in their locality.
- 3. **Vocational Training:** The training program facilitates building skills amongst the women home-makers a chance to learn advanced techniques in cutting & tailoring as well as beauty culture by upgrading their skills to make them self-employed and secure livelihood thereby improve their social status.

Emergency & Crisis Response

- 1. **Crisis Intervention Centre:** SES is successfully running a family counselling centre at the administrative office, focusing on providing counselling to vulnerable women & enabling them to solve various crisis in their lives including socio-legal issues, domestic violence, etc. SES has a pool of senior advocates who facilitate legal counselling to the target community.
- **2. Legal HelpDesk**: SES with the support of its team of legal experts provides a help desk support in its administrative office at Kishan Ganj. This initiative focusses on extending free legal counseling and litigation support to women in difficult circumstances in the target community.
- **3. Mobile Helpline:** SES is running 181helpline in East Delhi which helps women in seeking necessary counseling and guidelines to address theirneeds. Our helpline responds to all the calls to meet the medical and legal emergencies as may be sought. Often we receive calls from victims from other districts and we ensure these cases are redirected and followed up depending on case to case basis.
- **4. Rape Crisis Cell (RCC):** The 24x7 helpline responds the emergency calls received and deploys a counsellor to provide support the victims (both children and women) to help them with the guidance on lodging complaint, seeking legal counsel and accessing medical, education and economic compensation as per through the department Delhi Women Commission.

- 5. **Shelter for Homeless:** SES hadset up and ran eight temporary night shelters in East Delhi, West Delhi and Southwest Delhi with its own resources for homeless people to provide shelter and safe sleeping place.
- 6. **Recreation Centre for Old Age Widows:** SES had been running a recreation centre for old age widows at Northeast Delhi for 30 elderly widows by providing them healthcare, nutritional support and recreation facilities.

Housing and Environment Sustainability

SES has been engaged in the organizing Housing and Environmental Sustainability program, training workshops etc. the main objective of this program is to disseminate environmental sanitation awareness and share various housing schemes amongst the local community

Accessing and leveraging existinggovernment schemes

SES consciously and actively explores building linkages to benefit all its targeted communities from the various government social protection schemes. These include education, skill training, healthcare & health insurance, improving living conditions, and strengthening household income like pensions. It helps and facilitates the socio-economically weaker community members to apply for their aadhar, pan, election cards and also helps in facilitating opening of bank accounts so that they are able to get the benefits of the schemes.

To ensure sustainability SES will cross-leverage collaboration withlike-minded organizations, CSR and corporate foundations, Government line departments, for the project for sustaining and scaling up the project including exploring financial support for the program.

Awareness building

- 1. **Environmental Issues:** Environmental Education among school children-SES has been engaging with the children and school teachers to sensitize and propagate the importance of protecting the environment by organizing various camps (planting saplings, painting and essay writing competitions, debates, rallies, health camps, programs, training workshops etc.
- 2. **Training Workshops and Demonstrations:** Training Workshops are conducted for Police personals, school students and general community covering different topics, such as balancing personal and professional life, diet & nutrition, solid waste management, vermicomposting, rainwater harvesting, environmental pollution etc. SES has also demonstrated the concept of Vermicomposting and Rainwater Harvesting in the past.
- 3. **Minority Awareness Camp:** Supported by the Delhi Commission for Minority, SES has conducted minority awareness camps in Lakshmi Nagar area of East Delhi, covering the topics such as role of Minority commission, introduction of Scheme specially for Minority, introduction of Schemes of Revenue Department, introduction of Loan schemes etc.
- 4. **Consumer Educating/Awareness Programmes:** SES organizes various education and awareness programmes such as capacity building programs on consumer's protection providing consumers sessions on awareness about their rights and how to protect those rights.
- 5. Celebration of World Consumer Day: SES celebratesWorld Consumer Day with the people of local communityby organizing various programmes like essay writing, quizzes

- etc. The programme has motivated the local community in promoting and protecting the Consumer's Rights.
- 6. **Road Safety Programmes:** SES organizes awareness programs on road safety among school students and in the community.

2022-23 At a Glance

Health Care Interventions

Community Based Peer-Lead Intervention (CPLI)

Funder: Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment and National Institute of Social Defence.

The Community Based Peer-Lead Intervention project is specially designed to address the needs of adolescents in the age group of 10-18 years in impoverished & marginalized communities who are at high risk of getting addicted or already under the influence of substance use. Program is focusses on the **positive influence and peer pressure created in the life of a child.**



As part of the programme, SES team initiates the assessment of among adolescents in impoverished & marginalized communities across East Delhi to understand the needs to ensure appropriate action to mitigate the same. SES has a two-pronged approach to address the issue **prevention and rehabilitation**.

To **ensure prevention**the team identifies, and trains children called **Peer Educators**who further reach out to vulnerable children/ adolescents of 10-18 yearsin the community who are non-substanceusers. The project conducts primary prevention activities through awareness programs through one-one and group counselling, street plays, engaging them through activities and thereby reducing the risk of substance use among children/adolescent/youth. In the current year, SES is working across 12 pockets of East Delhi, with 200 wherein it has trained 20 such peer educators who are actively engaged with 10 more children (peer educators) from communities who are engaged in the sensitization and awareness building.



To address rehabilitation for the affected children, in addition to initial discussion with the children and families, on a case-by-case basis counselling and follow-up is provided to the substance users. SES also facilitates rehabilitation for children who are under heavy usage of substance by referring them to rehabilitation centres.

In addition to bring awareness amongst the children and youth SES observed Anti-TobaccoDay on 31st May and children were shown videos on the bad effects of tobacco on our life. Our counsellors addressed the gathering and shared the ill effects of tobacco and addressed their queries. On 26th June we organized a drawing competition on drug abuse. After a thought-provoking discussion on drug abuse and its effect on our life. After this discussion, the children started drawing. They expressed their emotions and ideas on paper on this subject and best three entries were appreciated and are displayed in the SES office. This not only made them realize the importance of the occasion but also instilled the thought of staying away from drugs.

As part of bringing communities closer to the government functionaries, we organized a meeting between police and youth of our area. As part of the Independence Day celebration, in August, we gathered children and youth in our area and went to meet the SHO of Laxmi Nagar. SHO Mr. Ramesh Prasad Singh warmly welcomed the children in his office and addressed the gathering. He said if a child is in need he/she should not hesitate to ask help from a police personal and Police officials are part of the community and are there to support when in need. He also briefed about the working of police and said that he want the children of his area to support them being eyes and ears to reduce crime. Further he urged them to join the police force in large number. Same of the children were motivated and showed interest in joining police. On that Mr. Singh said that for this they have to focus on their studies and Fitness. Children also said that since they are part of the Society they understand the importance of staying fit and away from any bad habit such as drugs. Mr. Amit Mishra also addressed the children and said that since they are the asset of the country they should stay away from drugs and other vices prevalent in the society.

Targeted Intervention (TI)

Funder: Delhi State AIDS Control Society (DSACS)

Targeted interventions are a resource-effective way to prevent HIV and run care programs in settings with low-level and concentrated HIV epidemics. They are also a cost-effective method of reaching people who are most at risk in more generalized epidemics.

In order to control the spread of HIV/AIDS and to reduce the rate of STI/RTI, SES has been running two TI projects across Delhi in Southwest Delhi and in Northeast Delhi. The target population is approximately a thousand for southwest and thousand for northeast Delhi. We are also dedicatedly working towards buildingawareness, aiming at offering prevention and care services to high-risk population of MSMs within the communities. We are equipping them with the information, means and skills to ensure minimizing HIV transmission but also enhancing their access to care, support and treatment services.

SES works towards sensitization and awareness building with MSMs in East Delhi to ensure they are free from disease-risk and do not face discrimination due to identity-based on their sexual orientation. For spreading knowledge and creating awareness regarding HIV/AIDS our Outreach Workers visit the target area daily. The Outreach Workers contacted MSMs and clients. With the help of one-to-one interactions which is well planned, they establish rapport with the clients. All the following steps are followed during the interaction with the community:

- Discuss general health issues.
- Enhance knowledge about STD and HIV-AIDS.

- Clarify of Myths, taboos, doubts and misconceptions.
- Provide knowledge on safe sex practices including correct and consistent use of condom.
- Provide information regarding treatment.
- Share information of existing health care services.
- Demonstrate Condom usage.
- Encourage them for counselling with a counsellor or & seeking support from doctor.
- Distribute pamphlets on the right practices and helpline for support.
- Fix date and time for next meeting.

Individual Counseling: As part of the individual counseling, we ensure confidential dialogue between the client and a service provider which involves the assessment of risk behavior, mental status, problem identification of the client and assisting them to take informed decisions about their future course of action. Our trained and experienced counsellors have succeeded in creating confidential dialogue with clients which involves assessment of risk behavior, mental status, problem identification of the client and assist them in taking informed decision about their future course of action. Prevention of STD/HIV infection requires behavioral changes in the individual. Since awareness generation activities alone are rarely enough to make people at risk take safety measures, our counsellors have been focusing on motivating male sex workers to examine their own risk and behaviors and thus ensure that the clients not only succeed in identifying options of safe behaviors but also develop the necessary skills to negotiate and become capable of adopting these safe behaviors. SES focuses one on one interpersonal approach which is needed to ensure the required behavioral change.

STD/RTI Treatment Services: Provision of STD treatment is an important component of AIDS prevention program. Research has clearly demonstrated that provision of STD treatment services at community level and educational programs which promote the usage of services can reduce HIV transmission substantially up to 40%. Counsellors take prompt and effective case detection and ensure treatment which results in immediate health benefits for individual patients. They also ensure curative case detection and treatment which also includes promotion of condoms/sterilized needle use for those groups/individuals who are at highest risk of acquiring STD and HIV infection.

Education And Communication for Behavior Change-Peer Education: Our counsellors have been training our peer educators for communicating information about STDs and HIV/AIDS which is seemingly difficult. As it is necessary to discuss sexual practices (A culturally taboo subject) and to be effective, bring the communication to a very personal level, 10 people from the target group who are culturally and physically closer to each other and whole values are similar, are being selected as peer educators. It is these Peer Educators who disseminate the message of STD and HIV/AIDS,motivating those in need to adopt required behavioral change. These Peer Educators are not only carrying forward the message in an informal manner and promoting condom usage within the groups and provided information but also promoting clinical services and motivating people to seek proper help for the treatment of STD.

Condom Promotion: We have been promoting condom usage and ensuring easy access to good quality and affordable condoms. For this we adopt social marketing techniques which is an important component of our program. Our team has been providing free condoms to female sex

workers and clients. Peer educators, middleman, rickshaw pullers, etc local Pan shop / tea stalls / Dhaba owners act asstock holder for supply of condoms.

Counseling and Testing Promotion: Voluntary counselling and testing (VCT) has a vital role to play within a comprehensive range of measures for HIV/AIDS prevention & support. VCT is promoted as part of advance intervention program for Core Groups. The objective is to prevent further spread of HIV. The counselling process helps an individual to evaluate his/her personal risk for HIV transmission, facilitate choice for HIV testing, provide emotional support before and after the HIV test.In this process, the actual HIVtesting services are provided through effective linkages with ICTC centers and MITWA mobile van with the support of DSACS/ Govt. Hospitals. People whose testsare negative, have counselling, guidance, and support to help them remain negative by initiating and maintaining safer sexual behavior. People who get positive status can have early access to a wide range of services including medical care, ongoing emotional support, and social support. These patients are registered in ART Clinics for ART Treatment and after that sent for CD - 4 counts.

COVID Vaccination Camp at Krishan Kunj Office, Laxmi Nagar

SES collaborated with the DM Office of East Delhi to organize a COVID vaccination camp. The camp was held at SES office. Amit Mishra, the President of SES, expressed the organization's commitment to achieving 100% vaccination in the area, considering the camp as a small step towards achieving 100% goal across the country. The camp was supervised by Sub-divisional Magistrate Rajender Kumar from the Preet Vihar region. The camp aimed to provide convenient access to COVID-19 vaccinations for the community.

The vaccination camp at Krishan Kunj office witnessed active participation from members of the community. Sub-divisional Magistrate Rajender Kumar from the Preet Vihar region oversaw the smooth functioning of the camp. The camp provided individuals with the opportunity to receive their COVID-19 vaccinations in a convenient and organized manner.

Amit Mishra, the President of SES, reiterated the organization's commitment to supporting the vaccination drive in India. The camp served as an important initiative to ensure that more people had access to vaccinations and contributed to the overall efforts to combat the COVID-19 pandemic.SES remains committed to supporting and promoting vaccination drives, underscoring the importance of vaccination in safeguarding public health.

Health Awareness Program:

SES emphasizes the importance of public health as a multi-disciplinary endeavor to meet the health needs of people from the community. The health scenario in our country demands both curative as well as preventive measures for deadly diseases like TB, cholera typhoid malaria cancer etc. It is a matter of big concern especially for people living in the poor and unhygienic environment of slums in urban India and most of the patients remain untreated or partially treated due to poverty, inadequate services or lack of awareness. SES has taken active action to provide basic health services for these underprivileged community and the succeeded in promoting health awareness, immunization family planning balance diet and hygiene within the community. We have also conducted awareness camp on WASH and safe drinking water. This also includes awareness program on anti quackery as in slum areas quacks are found to be

active. Our team specially focus on disseminating information against quackery, encouraging people from availing proper medical help and services.

Health Awareness Camps

With the purpose of creating awareness regarding health, SES has been organizing camps in slums and resettlement colonies of East Delhi. The camps were observed by day long awareness sessions, spreading knowledge and as well as busting myths and misconceptions amongst community members on various health issues HIV/AIDS, Cancer, TB, Dengue etc. Also, a team of doctors facilitated general health checkup, distribution of general medicines at the health camp. Our team has also been exhibiting and distributing different IEC materials along with group discussions and one to one interaction for spreading the message of health and fitness.

Cancer Screening & Awareness Camps

SES, dedicated to advancing cancer care, has organized five impactful health camps in Uttar Pradesh. Through these initiatives, SES has effectively screened more than 150 individuals for cancer. In addition to screening, SES has established a strong network of connections, ensuring prompt referrals and access to specialized treatment and support services for diagnosed individuals. These health camps also play a crucial role in imparting essential information on cancer prevention, early detection, and available treatment options. The emphasis on screening serves as a proactive measure to identify potential cases early, enabling timely intervention and enhancing treatment outcomes.

SES Campaign for a Healthy and Educated Society

SES launched a campaign aimed at creating a healthy and educated society. Recognizing that a prosperous future relies on the foundation of a healthy and educated population, SES President Amit Mishra announced the organization's commitment to providing health and education services to the most vulnerable sections of society. As part of the campaign, SES identified children lacking access to nutritious food and distributed Horlicks and juice boxes among them. The initiative aimed to address nutritional deficiencies and improve the physical health of the underprivileged children. Additionally, an appeal was made to the privileged sections of society to actively contribute to this noble cause. The call for support aimed to mobilize resources and encourage collective efforts towards societal upliftment.

Women Health & Empowerment:

Menstrual Health and Hygiene (MHH)Awareness Programme

MenstrualHealthandHygiene(MHH)iscritical for thewell-beingandempowerment of and adolescent girls however it is one of the major issues culturally which is taboo and discriminatorysocialnorm thereby constraint women in many societies especially in slum areas of India. Poormenstrualhygiene, however, canposeserious healthr isks,likereproductiveandurinarytractinfectionswhichca nresultinfutureinfertilityand birth complications.



Toaddressthisissue, with the support of Prime Research and Advertising Limited SES organised Menstruation Hygiene Campaign for five months (Sep'22 to Jan'23) in the slum areas of Lakshmi Nagar, Delhi such as Yamuna Khadar Krishan Kunj Cluster, Ansar Nagarand Chitra Vihar.



SESteamidentified around 1200 women/girls who never use sanitary napkins during their menstrual cycle. These women were not aware of the hygienic benefits of using sanitary napkin and felt it is wastage of money. They were unaware of the health risk of using old cloth material leading to health complications and poor hygiene during their menstrual cycle.

SES team reached out to these women one to one basis, making door to door visits every household and organizedgroupmeeting to spread

awarenessabouttheMenstrualHygieneduringMenstrualCycle andbenefitof using sanitary napkin.

Team highlighted that when women/girls have access to safe and affordablesanitary materials to manage their menstruation, they substantially decrease the risk ofinfections. This can have a cascading effect on overall sexual and reproductivehealth,including reducing teen pregnancy, complications during pregnancy and delivery and fertility.

Formanywomen,themenstrualcyclecandisrupttheirdailylivesandcausediscomfort in carrying out day to daytasks. Whilediscomfortssuchasmusclecramps, soreness, generaltiredness and acne are a regular part of the menstrual cycle, it can take adangerous turn if proper menstrually gieneis not followed leading to heavy flow and infection in the vaginal area.

The team tried their best to bust all themyths around period and made them understandhowimportantitistotalkonthistopicasMenstrualcycleisanaturalmonthlybiologicalproce ss where the uterus discharges blood andtissues. Further explained the safe and hygienic way of disposing sanitary napkin after useand under no condition should be flushed as it can causeblockage. Any lapse in personal hygiene at the time of disposal can cause infection not only for them but also for the peoplearound them.

SES team distributed 15 sanitary napkins to eachwoman for five months and ensure regular followupwiththem. As are sult of this campaign, now women understood the benefit of personal hygiene during the Menstrual cycle as well as benefit of sanitary napkin. They feel more empowered, and it boostst heir self-confidence.

Mahila Panchayat Project

Funder: Delhi Women Commission.

Mahila Panchayat (MP) was launched in the year 2001 by the Delhi Commission for Women. It is an initiative taken up for legal empowerment of women and for distress redressal the community level. Groups of community women, identified by NGOs, form a panchayat in their area, take up local disputes, counsel the two parties and assist them in reducing violence and disputes in their locality. There are two paralegal workers in a panchayat. These women are selected from the community, are trained in the different laws pertaining to women and



guided in the process of handling a case and counselling women in distress.

SES has been running twoMahila Panchayats in Laxmi Nagar and Jagat Puri area with the support of Delhi Commission of Women. Mahila Panchayat has a group of 50 women who are actively working for spreadingawareness among the women in the community about their legal rights and provide them family as well as individual counselling. SES organized various legal rights workshops by advocates from Delhi Legal Aid Services Authority, camps for minorities, seminars on mental health of women, helping old-aged widows and we have succeeded in uniting thousands of families in distress.

Emergency & Crisis Response

Rape Crisis Cell (RCC)Project Funded by Delhi Women Commission:

SES has been running Rape Crises Cells with the support of Delhi Commission for Women. In our organization, currently there are twenty-six advocates who are working in the RCC program in three districts of Delhi(East, West and Northeast) which covers fifteen advocates appointed in POCSO, seven in Special Fast Track Courts (SFTC) and two inJuvenile Justice Boards (JJB), with one legal supervisor and one assistant legal supervisor taking care of the functioning of all lawyers. There are a total of 23 advocates who are working in the POCSO and SFTC for assisting the rape victims during their entire court proceedings. There are so many barriers in obtaining justice and critical support services in rape cases. In such cases our advocates stand firmly with the victims and provides them with social-mental support & legal counselling before recording their statement under section 164 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) and thus help in ensuring justice for the victims and appropriate action against the perpetrators. Our Advocates also help the victimsin getting their grants released for financial support including education, health and livelihood.



Legal Awareness Camp

Delhi Legal Services Authority (DLSA) in collaboration with SES conducted many legal awareness camps in East District, Northeast District, Southwest District Central district, and West district of Delhi. We have a team of 5 Advocates as our resource persons. Interactive sessions were organized

mainly to spread awareness about theRole of DCW and how DCW can help the victims of POCSO Act, Sexual assault and Sexual Harassment with women and children. There was close interaction among resource persons, ladies and children of the community from various areas of Delhi state. More than 900 people participated and benefited in the legal awareness camps where they were informed about their rights and to understand their circumstantial problems in detail in case of sexual assault and sexual harassments.

During one such campJudge Saima Jameel, (Judge inKarkardoma Court) addressed80 women from the community, briefed them about the laws and issues related with 'domestic violence', laws of marriage and rights of women in case of separation and divorce. It was very encouraging to see the active participation of the women as many of them sought clarity duing the question and answer session.

Family Counselling:

SES runs a family counseling center at its administrative office. This initiative focusses on extending counseling to women in difficulties, thus enabling them to solve the crisis in lives, with the support of its team of senior advocates, providing legal counseling to the target community. The society is also associated with Delhi Social Welfare Board (DSWB) and conducting women awareness program time to time.

Crisis Intervention Centre (CIC) Project Funder: The Delhi Women Commission

SES has been running CIC program in 3 districts of Delhi namely, Southwest, Dwarka and West to provide crisis intervention for rape victims, their families and communitymembers close to the victim. Our counselors are diligently working with victims to reduce the ongoing trauma and provide counselling. Weensure the confidentiality of the victim and provide support to the victim in some of the legal proceedings such as M.L.C., F.I.R., shelter etc. Our team has got the privilege of helping approximately 1,000 rape victims during this year.

Mobile Helpline Number (181) Funder: Delhi Women Commission.

To help women in distress24x7, Delhi Commission for Women (DCW) started the phone 'Helpline181' in March 2000. The phone number is advertised through multiple media to build awareness amongst the public and the women in distress are encouraged to seek counselling as per need throughout the year. SES has been running mobile helpline in southwest, Najafgarh and East districts of Delhi. Our trained counsellors are dedicatedly working in eight hours shift, 24x7 throughout the year. Ourcounsellors listen to the problems over the helpline and counsel the



complainant to solve their problem as soon as possible and thus getMLC and/or FIR of the case registered. Problems which require counselling of the other party (accused) are advised to be registered in the commission personally. We are efficiently dealing with more than five hundred cases in a month.

Recreation Centre for Old Widows

SES has been running a recreation center for elderly widows in Northeast Delhi. We provide recreation, health, and nutritional facilities to 25 old women.

Education Programme: Remedial and non formal education:

SES runsanlearning center and remedial sessions to provide education to poor students of SC/ST/OBC and economically weaker section of the community. This program targets children in the age group of 6 to 14 years, who either have never attended school or who have dropped out of school due to family situation for taking care of their siblings or providing support to their parents in earning. This programme focusses on ensuring children attain their age and class



appropriate coaching which will enable them to get admissions in formal schools. The project supports 65 students.

School Bags and Stationery Distribution by SES - Empowering Needy Children

SES continues its dedicated efforts towards the upliftment of underprivileged and downtrodden children. As part of its initiatives, SES organized a distribution camp for school bag and stationary items, providing essential supplies to 100 needy children. The event was graced by ADM Puneet Patel as the Chief Guest. In his address, he appealed to individuals from well-off families to foster a sense of responsibility, compassion and actively work for the betterment of underprivileged members of society. ACP Sub Division Preet Vihar, Kailash Chandra Kukreti, emphasized the importance of education in shaping the future of children. His address aimed to inspire the young participants and motivate them to prioritize their studies for a better tomorrow. SHO Laxmi Nagar, Ramesh Kumar, assured the children that the police were their friends and encouraged them to approach the authorities whenever needed. Further he sensitized children about the concept of good touch and bad touch, emphasizing the importance of personal safety.

SES President Amit Mishra highlighted the significance of engaging in healthy, open and meaningful dialogues with the younger generation. He highlighted the organization's commitment to providing access to authentic and legitimate information to empower the youth.

SES also facilitated a free career counseling to the children through 'Shiksha with Sufi' at the event providing guidance and support in making informed decisions about their future endeavors. This initiative aimed to equip the children with the necessary knowledge and resources to pursue their career aspirations. Mr. Islammudin, Rajendra Salim, Rafiqn Sumit Sharma, Imran, and Rafique Ansari were also present to support the cause.

The event showcased the collective effort of SES and its partners to empower underprivileged children and create equal opportunities for their education. This initiative aimed to ease the burden of educational expenses for families facing financial constraints and encourage children

to pursue their education with enthusiasm.

Environmental Sustainability

Promoting Environmental Education Among Schools:

SES has been engaged in organizing camps, programs, training workshops on environmental issues including solid waste management, reducing environmental pollution, rainwater harvesting and vermicompost. The main objective ofthese educational programs is to disseminate sensitivity amongstschool community (both students and teachers) through various activities like painting competitions, writing essay competitions debates, rallies, plantation,



National Environmental Awareness Campaign(NEAC) program, health camps etc. These initiatives have helped in spreading the Message of environmental conservation and protection among students and through them to general masses.

Training Workshops and Demonstrations:

Training Workshops were conducted on various topicslike Solid Waste Management, Vermicomposting, Rainwater Harvesting and WASH, Environmental sanitation, reducing pollutionin the schools and general community.SES has also demonstrated the concept of Vermicomposting and Rainwater Harvesting to the target group.

National Environmental Awareness Campaign:

SES has been organizing for the NEAC Program, and in the current year we organized workshop for one day campaign as a part of National Environment Awareness Campaign. Approximately 70 participants attended this workshop.

Awareness Building on Social Issues Campaign Against Child Marriage in East Delhi

Accessing Government social protection schemes

These include education, skill training, healthcare & health insurance, improving living conditions, andstrengthening household income like pensions. It helps and facilitates the socio-economically weaker community members to apply for their aadhar, pan, election cards and helps in facilitating opening of bank accounts so that they are able to get the benefits of the schemes.
